What better way to express our appreciation, but to sing!

Hymn for America was written by Grammy award winning composer, Stephen Paulus for the Mormon Tabernacle Choir in 2004. Certainly, this piece would fit into our annual Veterans concert. However, the text by Dennis Browne reminds us of the stunning beauty that is around every corner in the USA. Not to be taken for granted, the freedom that we have been granted to live in this land is certainly priceless. For this we offer gratitude.

The Book of Ecclesiastes offers a very famous and poignant passage of scripture reminding us of the delicate circle of life. You Are the New Day was written in 1978 by the immensely talented Welsh composer John David. During a particularly difficult time he writes ... "I started singing to the (hopefully) soon-to arrive New Day like it was an entity, that would rescue me from the depths. If the sun came up and the birds started singing as usual then I could believe that it really was the new day in which life would go on, and in which hope would survive." This arrangement by Peter Knight was commissioned by the Kings Singers and has become a staple of their repertoire for past forty years.

One of the things that the Willamette Master Chorus values is the diversity of music and culture that surrounds us every day. The organization recognizes the land in which we live, and work was first inhabited by native people and tribes. The men of the Chorus offer *Ute Sundance*. It is a song of renewal sung by the Ute Tribe at the beginning of the new year and is one of the Ute's most important rites of passage. Debts, misunderstandings, and grudges are forgiven, so that no one needs to start the new year with old negativity. The young men of the tribe enact a dance, personifying the release of the pain experienced in the community during the past year. The Willamette Master Chorus offers this sentiment in performing this piece honoring the Ute Tribe. The music is adapted by Ute native Valerie Naranjo and arranged for chorus by Portland State University faculty member Ethan Sperry.

Baptist minister and composer Robert Lowry wrote the music to How Can I Keep from Singing in 1869. The text is anonymous. This hymn has entered the mainstream of Protestant hymnals during the last part of the 20th and first part of the 21st century. Erroneously attributed to the Quaker hymnal, this melody was interestingly picked up by Pete Seeger in the 1960's. The words of this hymn encapsulate gratitude we feel in expressing ourselves through singing!

During this concert we take a special moment to offer thanks to the men and women who helped all of us deal with, and move through, the epic ice storm of 2021. When I think of that challenging week in February, I am amazed at the perseverance and hard work it took to restore power, regain Wi-Fi, and remove damaged trees from streets and power lines. Chorus member Mark Lindsey has set this text to Ryan Amend's melody, offering thanks to Lineworkers everywhere!

Gratitude can also be expressed by those who are music makers. The members of the Willamette Master Chorus do not take this privilege lightly. I have selected Eric Nelson's setting of Arthur O'Shaughnessy's poem We Are the Music Makers as the centerpiece of this concert. The poem is an ode to the ones who dream and create. It is a tribute to artists, poets, writers, and musicians who shape the world through their art. The poem celebrates those who refuse to play by the book and create a world of their own, and who, despite being misunderstood by people, play a great role in shaping the age they live in and bestow their work for posterity to keep. Published in 1873, O'Shaughnessy's The Ode is also known by its first line, "We Are The Music Makers." It is far from being just a celebratory ode to the "music makers," the poem also explores the agency of art in the lived experience of people and how art affects the various aspects of society ranging from politics to religion. Sparkling with exuberant optimism, this poem celebrates art, lauds the creative spirit, and asserts that the dreamers of dreams have an active role to shape the age they live in. It doesn't limit itself to a particular form of art but includes all the creative and artistic endeavors pursued by humans.

The opening phrases of the traditional spiritual *This Little Light of Mine* launch this exciting work into Keith Hampton's original words and music, which feature a sixteen-measure soprano solo sung to lines from tenth-century poet Grigor Narekatzi's Book of Mournful Chants: "Don't let the light that You've given me die, and don't desert my mind. But let the one who serves You Praise You again and again." The repeated responses "He lives in us as True Light" and "God gave the world True Light" give solid impact to every phrase.

The Willamette Master Chorus invites you to our Spring Concerts entitled "Songs of Perseverance" on April 30 and May 1 at 3:00 P.M. We sincerely hope that both performances will be in-person at Hudson Hall. We also are aware of the need to deliver an on-line option and will endeavor to offer that as well. Stay tuned and stay safe.

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
